- Legislative framework intended to improve the competitiveness of rail
- 4th Package is an evolution to address the areas where experience shows change is necessary
- Lack of mutual recognition
- Lack of harmonisation & transparency
- National barriers
- NSA capability

Progress timeline (Year) 1804



- Agency role where it can add value
- Address the problems identified in the Impact Assessment and information from monitoring
- Based on collaboration
- Clarity of roles and processes
- Harmonisation suggests single European process



Future Role - Authorisation

- Rolling Stock Authorisation for placing on the market in collaboration with NSAs (core EU element, supplementary elements depend on extent of area covered)
- Greater involvement in ERTMS authorisation to reduce the risk of national barriers developing
- Greater role in resolution of declaration issues
- Strengthened role with conformity assessment bodies



Future Role – Safety

- Issuing Single Safety Certificates
- Knowledge transfer between and conformity assessment and supervision
- Receiving return of experience
- Collaboration with NSAs
- Clarity of criteria and process



Future Role – Monitoring/Facilitating

- Evolution of the Audit regimes
- Evolution of safety performance monitoring
- Enhanced communication/dissemination activities (targeted and with Board oversight)
- Greater role in supporting the reduction of national rules
